Before you get to the Gospel reading today, try this little quiz: How many of the original 12 apostles can you name? Some will be easy – the ones that get mentioned in other Gospels, and in the Acts. While the memorable ones have names that have become quite common (especially in our family!) a couple never get mentioned again, and have names that you rarely hear.

I've also been asked to remind everyone that there are a lot of phone scams at the moment – people ringing up 'offering' to help you pay bills, sort out your computer, or even providing a COVID-19 check – in return for your credit or debit card or bank details. If you think a call might



be genuine, it's safer to ring back using a number you've found yourself (eg on your bill or online account).

Matthew 9: 35 – 10: 8 (9-23)

The Sunday Amersham Methodist Circuit service this week focuses on the Romans and Matthew readings. MHA Sunday

14 June is MHA Sunday, when we would normally pray for, and have a collection for Methodist Homes (previously Methodist Homes for the Aged, hence MHA).



Nigel Wright has provided this information on MHA.

'MHA was founded in 1943 by Rev Walter Hall and the Methodist Church as an independent charity to provide care, support and accommodation for older people in need. The first residential care home was opened in 1945 at Ryelands, Wallington. I used to take regular services at MHA Ryelands while I was in the Sutton Circuit, and previously at MHA Woodbank in the Woking and Walton-on-Thames Circuit. Services at these MHA Homes were included as preaching appointments on the local circuit plans.

There was a fascinating report on Newsnight on 3 June about the work of MHA during the COVID-19 outbreak which can be found on <u>iPlayer</u>.'
